Editorial

Welcome to the February newsletter, I hope you had a lovely Christmas and that the New Year will be a happy one both personally and for our wonderful village. Does seem a long time ago now!

Some good news to start off the New Year, just before Christmas we learnt that Sharon & Rob will not be leaving the Chestnut Horse which is great news for our village as well as for them and their family. They will continue to provide home cooked food and a warm welcome. Please support them if you can as this is the only amenity we have in the village and were it to close it would be a big loss for the village. Planning is at times a contentious subject with people's views swayed to support or object to an application based upon how it affects them personally. Some applications have more impact on the village than others. Regardless of where in the village you live, engaging in the application process is important as it allows decisions to be made based on wide consultation.

You will see on page 7 Finborough School's invitation to a public meeting to learn about a planning application to build a 120 room dormitory and extend other school facilities. On Saturday, 30 December 2023, Finborough School and the Parish Council held a meeting on the site. Regrettably due to newsletter publication deadlines this meeting was not widely publicised but was still attended by approximately 30 locals including parish councillors and James Matthison, our District Councillor. Following feedback the school agreed to hold another meeting to give all villagers the opportunity to learn more about their plans. By the time you receive this newsletter the plans will have been submitted to Mid Suffolk Council for planning approval. I would encourage you to attend if you are interested so you are fully informed of the proposed development and how these affect our open spaces and the footpath behind the church and current school boundary.

Over the long Christmas break as editor I have reflected on the role of this newsletter in our community. It is produced by the Parish Council for the benefit of those living in the village. I believe the newsletter is an important means of communication, providing the only way to reach everyone living in Great Finborough, keeping villagers informed about events of interest and decisions that affect the community. What I have realised is that there is something missing... giving residents an opportunity to air their views. I am independent of the Parish Council and as editor I need to remain impartial, but that does not mean I should not publish items from people with differing views as this opens up debate and supports democracy. Our Parish Councillors are there to represent the views of us all, they can only do that if residents let them know how they feel about things that are happening in the village that affect them, both good and bad.

Since taking on the role of editor I have regularly encouraged residents to become more engaged with the Parish Council and I have sought to introduce new items to make this a more inclusive publication. I often receive communications from individuals raising concerns or expressing gratitude for an act of kindness. With that in mind I plan to introduce a 'Letters to the Editor' section to publish these communications where relevant. Please remain courteous if you do send me anything you wish me to include. The editor will decide whether or not to publish.

Planning - Our January meeting had several planning applications to consider and a good turnout of members of the public. The Parish Council are a statutory consultee on planning applications within the parish and this means that they are expected to consider each application, take on board any residents comments and formulate a response to Mid Suffolk District Council based on relevant material planning considerations. The planning officer then hopefully takes these comments into consideration when determining the Mid Suffolk District Council's final decisions.

Bus Services - In collaboration with Bildeston and Hitcham Parish Councils we have submitted an application to the Suffolk County Council Bus Improvement Fund for a share of that funding to provide additional bus services from Hadleigh to Stowmarket via Great Finborough. The service requested that will benefit Great Finborough is a Mon - Fri bus leaving Hadleigh at 7.30am getting to Stowmarket at 8.15 to meet the college bus and the first off peak London train with a return bus leaving Stowmarket at 4.35pm. Hadleigh Community Transport has agreed that they would be interested in providing this service and we wait to see if we will be successful. If you would use this service or know anyone that would welcome these additional weekday buses please can you let us know, any data we can put together for user numbers will help the application.

Flooding - Flooding at best causes disruption on our roads and at worst is devastating for those whose home is breached by the water. The County Council are keen to help those who have suffered flood water in their home and if you or anyone you know hasn't already contacted them for help please make sure you do. The parish council are committed to doing everything they can to alleviate flooding in the parish and have recently created a Flood Resilience Working Group with the aim to try and establish a joint effort with neighbouring parishes to explore practical solutions to improve the resilience of our community against future flood events.

The first step is to seek advice on what we can do on the ground to, most urgently, prevent water from entering our residents homes yet again and secondly to try and keep more of the roads open next time it rains. Actions in the future could be establishing balancing ponds in an effort to relieve some of the flooding of the River Ratt or to clear tributaries feeding into the river. With the best will in the world we can only facilitate projects such as these with the guidance of professionals so our first steps are collaboration with the Suffolk Flood Management Group and the Environment Agency. As you can imagine these agencies are very busy so if there are any residents with professional experience of this type of thing or you know someone else who might be able to give valuable advice to us please do get in touch we really would appreciate your help.

Finance - January brings our budget considerations and this year has proved challenging, ensuring we can balance the books, cover the massive increase in costs such as electricity and Mid Suffolk DC's decision to increase the cost of litter and dog bin emptying by 25%, with further increases to come, and trying to make the least impact on residents pockets as possible is difficult. The budget for 2024/2025 was finally approved with a requirement for £16342 needing to be raised by the precept. This will result in an 11% increase in the Parish Council part of residents Council Tax based on a Band D property for the year. We realise this seems a huge increase in percentage terms but hope that it doesn't look so bad when looked at in a monetary value of £4.81 for the whole year, so for a Band D property that's up from £43.75 to £48.56 for the year.

Flooding

With two major storms, the Council has worked hard to help residents in affected homes and businesses.

Householders are being urged to report flood damage via Suffolk County Council's reporting tool: https://www.suffolk.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/flooding-and-drainage/report-a-flood-in-suffolk

The government financial support is available where homes have been inundated, once you have logged your details as above. Affected businesses should contact Mid Suffolk to register for support. Please visit www.midsuffolk.gov.uk for full details.

Empty Homes

Mid Suffolk is keen to bring into use as many as possible of the empty homes in the District, currently about 680, some of which have been empty for 2 years or more. Help is available to owners, such as:

- general advice and support
- construction support and project planning
- interest free loan assistance
- landlord lettings and income assistance

The council will also be increasing the penalties for leaving homes empty, by levying additional council tax, rising if homes remain unused. This is to incentivise owners to bring empty and under-utilised properties back into use and to maximise revenue. More information is available at: https://www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/empty-homes

Recycling and Repairing

Repairing generally uses far less energy and materials than throwing away and buying new. Volunteers at the Repair Café are skilled in repairing clothing, jewellery, general fixing and glueing furniture, toys, bicycles and electrical repairs. Stowmarket Food Bank

Please donate a couple of tins or jars if you can afford it, each time you are buying food and household items. There are collection baskets at Asda, Lidl, Tesco, Aldi, all local Co-ops, Stowupland Garage, and also Stowmarket Community Centre.

Letter from Coombs Rectory

This year Easter will be celebrated early with Easter Sunday falling on the 31 March. This means of course that everything that precedes this major Christian feast also moves forward. So, although it seems we've only just got over Christmas, Shrove Tuesday will take place on 13 February, with Lent properly beginning on Wednesday 14 February, Ash Wednesday, which is also of course St Valentine's Day!

Shrove Tuesday gives us the opportunity to have a feast by using up flour, eggs and butter to make pancakes before the traditional Lenten fast begins. But what is Lent exactly and why do people try to give up things during this period?

Lent runs until Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday. It's a period that represents the 40 days Jesus fasted in the desert and opposed the temptations offered by the devil before his crucifixion in Jerusalem which Christians commemorate on Good Friday. The purpose of Lent is for people of faith to prepare for Easter and the risen Christ and this has traditionally been done by prayer, fasting and almsgiving to replicate the experiences of Jesus in the desert.

Now I expect that most of us have at one time or another decided to give up something we really enjoy for Lent. For me it tends to be chocolate or cake but it could be all sorts of things such as spending too much time on our electronic devices, a favourite food or drink or binge-watching TV box sets. The important thing is that whatever we decide to give up for Lent, we do so with the right intention and understanding that it helps us to prepare for Easter.

Another practice that Christians will often include as part of their Lenten preparations is that of prayer and spiritual reflection. This can be done individually or in a group specifically set up for that purpose. Within the Benefice the beginning of Lent will be marked by a church service on Ash Wednesday, 14 February, at Trinity Hall in Onehouse. There will be the opportunity to have ashes, mixed with oil, marked on your forehead in the shape of a cross. This is to remind us of the sins we have committed and to encourage us, during Lent, to reflect on how to repent for those sins and grow in holiness so that we're ready to joyfully

celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday. And there will be the opportunity to join our Lent course which will run on Thursday mornings (15, 22, 29 February, 7, 14 March) on Zoom. We'll be using the Watch and Pray: Wisdom and Hope for Lent and Life booklet prepared by the Church of England. If you'd like to know more please email: revdsarahjenkins@gmail.com.

One final activity that Christians are encouraged to do during Lent is to give alms. However, this doesn't just mean putting money in a collection box or donating via an on-line giving website. Giving alms can encompass a wide range of activities, it could be buying extra shopping and donating it to the local food bank, offering your time to help an elderly neighbour or volunteering for a charity. There are a multitude of ways in which to give alms and by spending a little time looking at what you could do, it will become clear that the people who are most in need will be helped by your generosity.

I do hope you enjoy your pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and that these words have given you food for thought about the period of Lent.

Mid Suffolk Citizens Advice

I've built up a bit of debt and I am panicking. Even though I cut back, Christmas was expensive, my rent has gone up and my paycheque just doesn't stretch as far as it used to. I'm doing everything I can but it's not enough - what can I do?

First of all it's important to know you're not alone in finding things difficult and, crucially, there's support available.

You say you've built up a bit of debt. The first step is to collect all the information you have about your debts. This might include contracts, bills and statements.

Next, make a list of your debts and write down the details of each. This could include whom you owe the money to (this person/company is your 'creditor'); when you first missed a payment; and how much you now owe. You'll also need to make a note of your account or reference number and what steps the creditor has taken to get the money back, eg. sending you letters.

It might feel overwhelming when you see all of your debts written down - but try not to worry, the important thing is that you're sorting them out.

If you're behind on household bills, prioritise paying your rent or mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first. Not paying these bills has the most serious consequences. You should speak to the person or company you owe money to, to see if there are any manageable steps you can take to start reducing your debt.

Once you've got these debts under control, you should look at any other debts like credit card or store card debts, payday loans or missed Buy Now Pay Later payments. While you're looking at the money going out, do remember to consider money that could be coming in. It's always worth checking if there are any benefits that you're eligible for, including support with your energy costs and living costs.

There's a benefits calculator, advice on how to reduce living costs and information on other ways to increase your income on the National Citizens Advice website at citizensadvice.org.uk

There's also emergency support that you may be able to access locally, such as a food bank, local welfare support or fuel vouchers. We know that times are incredibly tough but please remember, you don't have to face this alone.

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can provide in depth advice on this issue and much more, including debt, finances, employment, benefits and family/relationships. 
